### Commodore's Comments

This year has been one of transition, more so than some of the prior years. With the hiring of a General Manager, we have shifted from being an Operational Board to a Policy Board. This has allowed the Board to turn its attention to long term planning while our General Manager deals with the endless day to day work of keeping things running efficiently. Glenn is doing a fine job of this and I for one am very grateful.

There has been awareness for some time that the infrastructure is in need of capital expenditure and that we should put more emphasis on membership renewal. While we are planning we will continue to look after pressing needs like replacing the engine on the Peel or repairing boat house roofs, but we would like to establish our long term priorities for the club and facilities sooner rather than later, so that we do not waste money doing things twice.

I encourage you to attend the meetings and share your thoughts and concerns. We would like to come out of all of this with a solid plan for future development. Our club is one we have been proud of and want to be proud of for generations to come. We need to sustain our growth and development and will only do so with involvement from you, our members.

We are trying something new this year. Please join us for a meal before the AGM. We are keeping the cost low to encourage everyone to come and enjoy a hearty meal before the meeting and have time to discuss agenda items in a relaxing environment. I hope to see you all there!

## Great Season for Able Sail Kingston, Some Challenges Lie Ahead Though!



Able Sail Kingston has had its biggest year yet, with record numbers of participants, who kept our very capable head instructor, Zoe Evans, busy all summer. 2010 was also the year that some of our specialized equipment - all of which was obtained used ten years ago - decided to give up. First our dock hoist, then our autohelm system, both very expensive pieces of equipment, gave up. We are set with a huge challenge to raise funds over the winter to replace them!

Our fleet, however, is in great shape. Thanks to Greg van Rossem and Clive Webber (who, sadly, has now left us to be a resident of Victoria), the boats were reconditioned and notwithstanding their age they still remain among the fastest boats in the fleet (some of which is due to the sailors).

The exciting news is that we purchased a (gently used), 2.4 Metre boat (actually, it is 13 feet long). This is the only boat ever to win an Olympic gold medal - with Paul Tingley at the helm in Beijing in 2008. Paired up with Audrey's personal 2.4, we have the possibility of match racing at KYC! The boat is very technical, very fast, and highly maneuverable. Be sure to check it out next summer.

**Paul Tingley** will be visiting us next month, as the star of the first ASK fundraiser of the season. Paul won a Gold Medal in the 2008 Beijing Paralympic Sailing Competition and recently won a 2.4 mR World Championship in September. ### PICTON JAZZ CRUISE, 2010

Of course the main event was Saturday Night at the Regent featuring Ranee Lee. This was a very classy performance that showed Ms. Lee's reknowned ability to channel the grand dames of jazz and reflected her work on the double album *Dark Divas...* and, as if exciting sailing, great jazz and cozy happy hours are not enough, this year's travellers lapped up the dinner reservations with 18 out to the Acoustic Grill (Friday night's new venue) and a whopping group of 32, the night after, at The Funky Carp. # Queen's Sailing Team

This is the 18<sup>th</sup> consecutive year that the Queen's Sailing Team (QST) has been based at KYC and what began as an experiment with the club is today a solid ongoing relationship.

This year the QST continued to maintain its strong membership with over 40 sailors. Furthermore, Queen's Recreational Sailing Club (QRSC) worked overtime to make sailing available to more than 50 members of the Queen's community, as over 300 people signed up! Sailing is taking root in the Queen's community and, with KYC's support, the QST and QRSC are making it accessible to students.

The QST is in a rebuilding year with 60% of its sailors in 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> year, and only 6 graduates this year. Despite this, the team has been very active, participating in over 18 regattas this fall, with more scheduled in the spring. This year the QST placed 5<sup>th</sup> at the Queen's Open, 6<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> at an extremely competitive Laser North 1, and top-half at Cornell Fall Open and North Fall 1. There were many strong performances from new recruits, and there are a couple of up-and-coming sailors to watch as they continue to develop on the QST.

We have traveled well over 10,000 km this year, well aware that we represent Queen's and KYC, along with our individual home-clubs. In most instances, Queen's competed at regattas in the United States as the sole non-American school, meaning we were ambassadors of Canadian Collegiate Sailing in general. All of us are proud to have done that well.

I am pleased to report that all QST sailors take an active role in maintaining all the assets we use and share. The 420's and dollies we co-own are, for the most part, in excellent condition. Normal wear aside, we're proud of the state of the vessels considering all the use they get as both JS and QST boats.

Next Spring we expect 4 QST Varsity Club members and 15 QRSC members to graduate. Some will undoubtedly move-on while others will, at least for a time, chose to remain in Kingston. The quality of sailing here, and our 4+ year affiliation with KYC plays a significant role in any decision by QST members to stay in Kingston after graduation.

Finally, as the president of the QST, I would like to thank KYC and its members for the opportunities that you have provided to myself and many other young sailors. The sailing team is one of the main reasons I came to Queen's, and during my time here it has provided me with countless memories and opportunities. Most importantly it has solidified my passion for the sport and I leave knowing that I will continue to sail for the rest of my life.

### Kings Town Players at KYC
